

Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG) 2.0 AA requires a contrast ratio of 4.5:1 for normal text

and 3:1 for large text. As a normal user these numbers might not mean anything to you, so rule of thumb keep the contrast between the colors high and make sure you can easily see the edges of the characters of the text. You can check your text/background contrast ratio here at this contrast ration checker website.

If you include audio files into your course you should make available an audio transcript of the file in case any of your students are hearing impaired. This way they are able to read the document without


